### Catalina Flying Memorial Ltd wins Government Grant

We are pleased to announce that the Catalina Flying Memorial Ltd (CFML) was successful in its application for funding to assist its volunteers under Volunteer Grants 2010. This will see the CFML awarded \$3,500 to enable the purchase of much needed equipment for our volunteers working on VH-CAT at Bankstown.

The Australian Government recognises that community organisations and their volunteers play a vital role in our local communities, donating their time, skills and understanding to our most vulnerable and disadvantaged Australians, helping out in times of crisis, preserving our environment and enriching our cultural life.

The \$21 million Volunteer Grants are a way for the Government to recognise and value the hard work of Australian volunteers who make a real and lasting difference in our local communities. This grant funding is also a way the Government can help ease the financial pressure for non-profit organisations, assist their volunteers and encourage more people to get involved in their community.

The money will be used to purchase ladders, trolleys and various items of safety equipment to enable our volunteers to access all those difficult to reach places on the aircraft and to facilitate the movement of heavy items. This will go a long way towards helping the CFML maintain its "safety first" culture.

We are extremely grateful for such support. A very big thank you to Mr Boffey and the members of the Kirribilli Ex Service Club.


Below is a copy of the poster that now resides above the memorial pool.

A wonderful afternoon was had by all. Many thanks again to the crew at the Kirribilli RSL.

Just an aside, I'd like to say a few words about Ron Prentice, the gentleman standing at right in the above photograph. Ron is now 90 Years of age and I can tell you, he is an absolutely remarkable man in so many ways. During the war, Ron served as a pilot with 461 Squadron RAAF which operated the Short Sunderland flying boat.

The RAAF had two UK-based Sunderland squadrons operating during the war – 10 & 461 Squadrons. 10 Squadron was formed in 1939. 461 Squadron was formed on 25 April (ANZAC Day) 1942 (hence it was often referred to as the ANZAC Squadron). Throughout the war, these two squadrons sunk a total of 12 U-boats, which is quite a remarkable feat when you consider that finding a U-boat in the vast expanses of the Bay of Biscay and the like to be very rare indeed. The vast majority of Sunderland aircrew will tell you that they managed to get through the entire war without seeing

anything – their war was one of long, seemingly endless and boring searches over vast stretches of ocean.

461 Squadron accounted for six of these U-boats over the three years from their formation to the end of the European conflict. Ron Prentice just happened to be the First Pilot of the Sunderland that sunk U-boat U-571. The following link will take you to a Wikipedia article about the sinking of U-571.

The captain of the aircraft was FTLT Richard David (Dick) Lucas. When Dick's tour came to an end, Ron took over the crew as Captain, seeing his operational tour out as Captain. Ron was also a fully qualified navigator and flying instructor and following his tour with 461 Squadron, saw the war out training pilots to fly the Sunderland. Ron has said to me on several occasions, the most recent being over coffee at the Kirribilli Club that he reckons he could still fly a Sunderland today if there was one still flying. I believe him!

I hope to tell you more about Ron and his Sunderland days in a future newsletter.

I should also mention that a Hollywood blockbuster movie was made in the year 2000 called simply *U-571*. In this movie (which, I should point out was a total work of fiction), a U-boat called U-571 was captured, enabling the German coding machine Enigma to be acquired by the British for the first time. When the real U-571 was sunk (not captured, as in the film) by Dick, Ron and their crew on 28 January 1944, the Enigma code had been well and truly unravelled by the allies long before. So it appears that the only similarity between the movie and actual events was the name of the U-boat.
